

# CCAP Priority: County Mental Health Funding

County mental health services are the backbone of Pennsylvania's behavioral health safety net—providing immediate, community-based care that prevents escalation, reduces hospitalizations, and limits involvement with law enforcement. Demand is rising rapidly, but funding has not kept pace.

## Demand is Surging

- Crisis service utilization **increased 52%** from FY2023 to FY2024<sup>1</sup>
- In FY2024, 601,484 individuals received county mental health services—12% required crisis intervention<sup>1</sup>
- **26% of crisis service users** were children under age 18<sup>1</sup>

This sharp growth reflects increasing behavioral health needs across all populations, especially among youth.

## Insurance Coverage Loss

Following the expiration of enhanced premium tax credits under H.R. 1:

- **145,000 Pennie enrollees lost coverage in 2026<sup>2</sup>**
- Since the expiration of insurance credits, Pennsylvania's crisis walk-in centers have experienced an **18% increase** in the number of individuals without insurance coverage<sup>3</sup>
- Counties are increasingly serving as the default provider of last resort

As access to routine care declines, more Pennsylvanians enter the system at the point of crisis—when care is most intensive and costly.

## How Additional Funding Would Be Used

Targeted state investment in county mental health services would help counties expand access to community-based care, strengthen local crisis response systems, and meet the growing demand for behavioral health services across the Commonwealth.

Funding would support:

- **Expansion of crisis walk-in centers**, including increased capacity to reduce wait times and meet growing demand
- **Clinical staffing and workforce stabilization**, addressing shortages and supporting timely assessments and interventions
- **Integration with mobile crisis and community-based services**, ensuring continuity of care beyond the initial crisis response

These investments ensure individuals receive the right care, at the right time, in the right setting, preventing escalation and reducing costly downstream impacts.

## CCAP Request

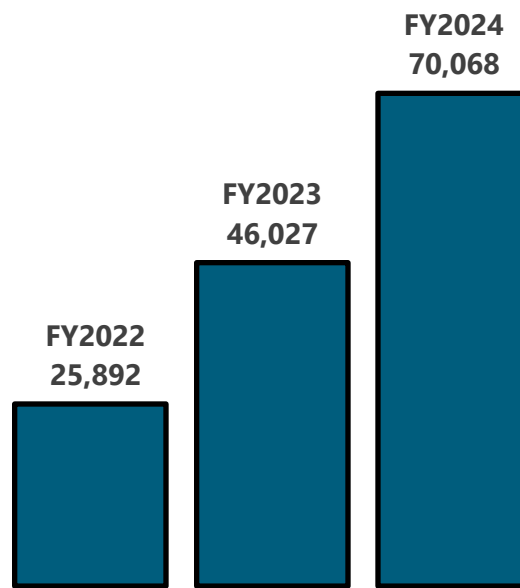
A total investment of **\$40 million in county mental health funding** to stabilize and expand community mental health and crisis services, meet growing demand, and ensure timely access to care in the least restrictive setting.

The funding request includes:

- **\$20 million in county mental health base funding** to support community-based mental health services; and
- **\$20 million dedicated to county mental health crisis services** to support county crisis infrastructure, including mobile crisis teams, crisis walk-in centers, and other local crisis response services.

County mental health crisis services save lives and reduce costs. Underfunding them shifts the burden to more expensive systems and leaves vulnerable Pennsylvanians without the help they need.
